Rector's Message

I realize this may not come as a surprise to you, but I love to pray. I find joy in prayers of petition for those on my heart, prayers of thanksgiving for my many blessings, and acts of oblation and almsgiving. I revel in the beauty of creation, in the taste and touch of bread and wine—the sacraments that nourish both body and soul.

A prayer life must be nourished, fed by Scripture and Sacrament. It also requires the sustenance of the communion of saints—our fellow parishioners and friends, both those who walk with us today and those who, in a greater light, have left us a legacy of faith. Their prayers, preserved in the *Book of Common Prayer* (1979) and in all its preceding editions, continue to shape and sustain us. These prayers invite us to reflect, to recognize our routines, to challenge our assumptions, and to grow in wisdom and grace.

I recently came across a prayer book with thirty-three prayers about weather—many centered on the harvest. By contrast, our *Book of Common Prayer* (1979) contains only a handful of prayers for the natural order. This speaks to a shift in our modern experience: many of us have become disconnected from the rhythms of nature, from our dependence on sunshine, rain, and the fruits of the earth. Even our awareness of storms has changed—what once was "turbulence" is now just "rough air." But I'm no pilot.

One prayer I read recently, *Thanksgiving for a Lean Year*, struck me. It reminded me that even in times of challenge, we can grow. The prayer reads:

"Almighty God and heavenly Father, who hast in wisdom seen fit to withhold from us at this time thine accustomed bounty: We most humbly praise thee for still bestowing on us far more than we deserve. Make us truly thankful for our many blessings; increase in us more and more a lively faith and love, and a humble submission to thy blessed will; through Jesus Christ our Lord."

Some of its language may not resonate with everyone, and that's okay. What stands out to me is its call to thanksgiving, to a deeper, more vibrant faith and love, even in difficult times.

This is especially meaningful as the Storm Resilience Committee nears the completion of its work and prepares its recommendation to the Vestry, which will be shared with the parish by email with a forum for thoughts and questions. The past few years have brought an abundance of hurricane damage, even after years of relative calm. Yet through these challenges—and in the work of resilience ahead—I have no doubt that God will continue to bless us, deepen our faith, and strengthen our love.

"Fill the Wagon" with Food for Babies in Golden Gate and Immokalee

Sunday, March 16th through Sunday, March 30th Blessing of the Wagons Sunday, April 6th



Please bring in these non-perishable food items to feed at-risk babies and children at Grace Place's Bright Beginnings Program in Golden Gate and the Meals of Hope Baby Food Pantry in Immokalee. Last year, there were 180 participants of pre-kindergarten age enrolled in Bright Beginnings while their parents attended classes on literacy and parenting. A 2024 Archangel Fund grant helped start up a stationary baby food pantry in Immokalee. It has been so successful, serving more than 300 babies and children up to 5 years old, three additional pantries have been set up and additional supplies are needed.

Maundy Thursday Liturgy and Prayer Watch April 17th 5:30 p.m.

The Maundy Thursday Eucharist commemorates the institution of the Sacrament of Holy Communion and Christ's giving of the new commandment to love one another as he loved us. Although we are on the threshold of Good Friday, the Eucharist is celebrated with solemn joy. The celebrant begins and those present may follow in the sharing of the washing of feet as Jesus mandated. This is an expressive symbol of the coming of God's Kingdom through the ministry and service of his followers who are nourished by the heavenly food of his banquet table.

The Altar of Repose reminds us of the Garden of Gethsemane, in which Jesus spent three agonizing hours between the Last Supper and his arrest. Additional bread and wine is consecrated at this Eucharist. This reserved sacrament is placed on the altar where it will remain until the Good Friday liturgy.

The Maundy Thursday Prayer Watch begins at the conclusion of the liturgy and continues throughout the night until Good Friday morning. Parishioners are encouraged to join in the Prayer Watch by signing up for a time slot, either an hour or half hour. The church remains open and parishioners are asked to keep the light burning while praying and/or meditating in the church. Jesus asked his disciples, "Could you not watch with me one hour?" What is our reply?

Good Friday April 18th, Noon

On this day, God's Friday, we falter before the enormity of the Cross. The liturgy of Good Friday is a solemn time of remembering Christ's Passion. The Altar is bare and we kneel in silence.

In the silence, which accompanies each of the solemn collects, we are invited to join the pain and sorrows of humanity to Christ's suffering. A cross is brought into our midst, the symbol of God's great outpouring of love for us.

We confess our sins and pray the Lord's Prayer. There is no Eucharist on this day. Instead, we receive Holy Communion from the sacrament consecrated the night before on Maundy Thursday. We give thanks and leave in silence.

The Great Vigil of Easter Holy Saturday April 19th, 8:00 p.m.

The oldest liturgy of the Christian Church is that of Easter Eve and the Easter Vigil. It consists of lighting the Paschal Candle, reading of scripture, the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, and the first Eucharist of Easter. The congregation gathers outside the darkened church. A new fire is struck and the Paschal Candle, the symbol of the Risen Christ, is lighted. The procession moves into the church with everyone holding hand candles. A cantor chants, "The light of Christ," and the people respond, "Thanks be to God!

The Easter-eve baptism(s) take place in the light of the Paschal Candle, symbol of the new light of the Risen Christ. This great candle is lighted for all baptisms and funerals throughout the coming year to remind us of this moment. The Eucharist begins with the celebrant's proclamation, "Alleluia, Christ is Risen!" The tower bell rings and the organ echoes its jubilant reply.

Easter Day April 20th

The Eucharists of Easter Eve and Easter Day celebrate the first and greatest of the Church's festivals. In our Easter communion, the risen Lord comes to us once more to nourish us with the life he gave us in baptism—a life that cannot be taken away or destroyed even by death.

annual visit on March 30th.




The Episcopal Church has a rich treasury of spiritual resources to support a faith-seeking life of prayer, especially in our Book of Common Prayer. Besides providing liturgies for Baptism, Eucharist Marriage, Burial, Confirmation and Ordination, the Prayer Book provides liturgies and prayers for individuals and families; and for special occasions. One resource is "The Daily Office," which includes services of Morning Prayer, Noonday Prayer, Evening Prayer and Compline for close of day.

The Faith-Seeking Journey participants will draw on these resources in developing a personal Rule of Life that includes prayer and other devotional practices, such as reading Scripture and occasionally fasting or spiritual exercises. The concept of "rule of life" is taken from the monastic tradition, which is also part of our Anglican Heritage.

The Faith-Seeking Journey is about more than rules and prayer. Members also enjoy small group conversation and sharing personal stories along the way. This is also a part of the English spiritual tradition, as every reader of **Geoffrey Chaucer's** Canterbury Tales knows.

Maundy Thursday Prayer Watch

We will be offering both in-person prayer watch and Live-Streaming of the church, stripped bare after the Maundy Thursday liturgy, in one-hour blocks. If you would like to participate via live stream – visit our Live-Stream page and simply pick an hour starting immediately after the Maundy Thursday liturgy and going until 8 a.m. on Good Friday. There is a sign-up poster in the Narthex for those who would like to attend in person, or you can sign up online. This is a time for you to pray, meditate, read the Bible, or just sit quietly. The reserved Sacrament will have been placed on the altar, where it will remain until the Good Friday liturgy.


TUESDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY



Holy Week and the Easter Promise - Walking the Way of the Cross

For six weeks of Lent, we spiritually prepare ourselves for receiving the gifts of Easter. Lent is a time of honesty about ourselves, self-denial, and reliance on the strength and guidance of the Holy Spirit to learn more about and to deepen our relationship with our Trinitarian God. I hope that your Lenten practices have been enriching and revealing to you, strengthening you, and leading you toward a joyous Easter morning.

But to get to Easter, we journey through Holy Week. The collect for Monday in Holy Week is:

Almighty God, whose most dear Son went not up to joy but first he suffered pain, and entered not into glory before he was crucified: Mercifully grant that we, walking in the way of the cross, may find it none other than the way of life and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

Trinity-by-the-Cove observes Holy Week with Palm Sunday liturgies, and the Triduum - Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil on Saturday evening. The best way to walk the way of the cross is with one another. To enter into the spiritual life of Holy Week is to experience as fully as possible all the events that occurred in and around Jerusalem. Together on Palm Sunday, we celebrate Jesus's triumphant entry to Jerusalem. After which, we do not come together until Maundy Thursday.

But the Holy Week story continues Monday (John 12:1-11), Tuesday (John 12:20-36), and Wednesday (John 13:21-32). These important passages give us the powerful context of Jesus's last days on earth. In Monday's scripture, Jesus spends an evening in Bethany with friends Martha, Mary, and Lazarus. Mary cares for him so tenderly by anointing him with costly nard. On Tuesday, in a large crowd, Jesus speaks of his death and the voice of God is heard. And finally on Wednesday, Jesus foretells his betrayal.

I will be meditating on these scriptures on these days so

that I have as much of the full picture of Jesus's path to crucifixion and the beauty of his Resurrection. I will be pondering these things:

I wonder where I fit into these scenes.

Pilgrimage

A Pilgrimage to Italy in 2026 - In the Steps of Peter and Paul


Think about joining a Trinity pilgrimage – an ancient tradition in Christianity, a special journey, a shared individual and group experience encountering the Holy Spirit in places sacred to our faith. We have begun planning for an exciting exploration of early Christianity in Italy from April 20th to May 11th, 2026.



The heart of the pilgrimage will be 10 days in Rome, the second early major center of Christianity, following the life,

death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ in Galilee, Judea, and Jerusalem. A Christian community was present in Rome soon after Jesus's death, certainly by the time of Emperor Claudius, who reigned 41-54 AD. Saints Peter and Paul were martyred there in the 60's. For the next 1,400 years, until the English and continental European reformations of the 16th century, Rome was the heart of western Christianity, and remains so today for the worldwide Catholic community. Visiting Rome is to encounter multiple sacred places dating to those ancient years, even though some have been more recently restored. At the same time, there will be opportunities to appreciate the scope and magnificence of the Roman Empire that was challenged by Jesus and succeeding Christians.

In Rome we will be, in our pilgrimage, able to honor the traditional sites of the martyrdoms of Peter, at the Vatican Basilica, and of Paul at the basilica in his name, Outside the Walls of medieval Rome. Highlights will include a visit to an 1,900 year old Roman temple, the Pantheon, converted in the 7th century into a still active Christian church. The Basilica of Santa Pudenziana was built over an early house church, thought to be the earliest site of Christian worship in Rome.

Pilgrimage

We'll visit one of the early Christian catacombs and see amazing Christian-themed art, found everywhere in

churches of Rome, such as the <u>Martyrdom of Saint Peter</u> by Caravaggio in the Basilica of Santa Maria del Popolo. The classical Roman Forum, the Colosseum, and museums of the Capitoline Hill will also be visited in this journey, and there will be many opportunities to enjoy authentic contemporary Roman cuisine.

We're planning a preliminary option of a five-day stay in our namesake, Naples, which will permit visits to Pompeii and Villa Poppaea (palace of one of Nero's wives), destroyed by the eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 CE.

There will be a day trip to the island of Capri, favorite resort of the Roman emperors.

In Naples, we'll visit the Cathedral of the Assumption of Mary, built over earlier churches, which were themselves built on the foundations of a Roman temple. Founded as a Greek colony in the 6th century BCE, there was a Christian presence in Naples by the 3rd century CE, attested by an ancient baptistry now incorporated into the cathedral. This group will travel to Rome to rendezvous with more pilgrims arriving from the U.S. In addition, we're planning an optional, five-day extension of the pilgrimage from Rome to Florence. En route, we'll stop to remember the life of 13th century Saint Francis at the basilica in Assisi in his name. In Florence, we'll explore the religion, art, and architecture of the Italian Renaissance, highlighted by Michelangelo's incredible David, the engineering marvel of Brunelleschi's Dome of the cathedral, and the glorious art treasures of the Uffizi Gallery.

We're still in the early planning stages, and want to alert interested parishioners and friends of this pilgrimage opportunity in 2026. We will need a group of 25-40 participants for the Rome portion for the pilgrimage to be affordable. The detailed itinerary, travel arrangements and trip costs will become available in 2025.
