

Rector's Message

In my daily prayers this week, the prophet Haggai came up. In Haggai's day, the people of God faced a question: would they build only for themselves, or would they turn their hearts and hands to God's house? Haggai's call was clear—"Consider how you have fared. Go up to the hills and bring wood and build the house, so that I may take pleasure in it and be honored" (Haggai 1:7–8). It was not just about bricks and mortar, but about setting priorities rightly, putting God first, and letting their lives be ordered around His presence.

The hymn *The Church's One Foundation* reminds us that the true cornerstone of our faith is Jesus Christ. Whether we are raising walls of stone or planting seeds of faith, the foundation remains the same: Christ is the one who holds us together and calls us forward.

Each of us, in our own way, is invited to discern what God is asking us to "build" in this season of life. Perhaps it is the quiet work of spiritual growth—deepening in prayer, in the knowledge of Scripture, or in the love of Christ. Perhaps it is the labor of building up relationships, strengthening family, or lending our gifts to the parish. For some, it may be sowing seeds of justice, mercy, and peace in our community, our nation, or our world. And part of that discernment is choosing to engage more fully in the life of the Church rather than giving so much of ourselves to activities that do not nurture our spiritual growth. One way to think about that discernment is through the lens of celebration. This month we gather for Trinitarians Together, our annual celebration of the ministry we share. Ask yourself: What do I celebrate most at Trinity-by-the-Cove? Let that joy guide your prayers—and perhaps even your next step of building on Christ's foundation.

Like the people in Haggai's time, we are reminded that our lives find meaning and purpose when they are rooted in God's call. What we build on Christ's foundation will endure, bearing fruit for generations.

As you read through the pages that follow, pause and consider: What is God asking you to plant or to build in this season—this month, or even today? What offering—worship, formation, fellowship, or service—can nurture your growth? How might your time, talent, and treasure strengthen our parish family in faith? Choose to engage more. And as you reflect on your own journey, look also to your fellow parishioners—those who sit beside you on Sunday. Encouragement can be simple: share a cup of coffee after church and thank an usher for their ministry, notice a young family and say hello, or tell someone with a birthday that you'll be praying for them this week. In each and every act in church, practice love for the people around you. Small gestures of kindness and acts of engagement, offered in Christ's name, help build up the Body just as surely as stone and timber.

How Trinity Does WELCOME

Each week, Trinity welcomes new guests to our church. Just as you would in your own home, it's a joy and a gift—our calling—to make them feel welcome. Here are some of the ways we extend a warm first impression and help lay the foundation for a continuing faith journey:

Before They Arrive

Informative Website & Signage: Our website lists details on what to expect and shares our service times.

During the Visit

A Warm Greeting: Volunteer greeters at the entrances intentionally seek out new faces, offering a warm welcome and answering any initial questions. They invite the guests to attend coffee hour to learn more and to meet others.

Personal Assistance: Our Parish Life Coordinator Ann Hudon, along with a team of dedicated Ambassadors, offer a tour and point out campus highlights.

Provide Resources: Our Welcome Center is full of detailed information about Bible studies, music concerts, and opportunities for fellowship. Encourage guests to sign the Guest Book and provide contact information.

Introduce Newcomers: we connect visitors with others who share similar interests or are in a similar life stage, such as other young adults or families.

Facilitate Meeting Leaders: Introducing visitors to our clergy and other key church leaders significantly increases their likelihood of returning.

After the Service

Timely Follow-Up: Each visitor receives a follow-up email the next day expressing excitement for their return. We thank them for visiting us, offering further connection opportunities, and inviting them back. A clergy member also sends a welcome message to each visitor.

Encourage Connection: Mention upcoming events or sermon series and provide information on how they can connect with church groups or activities.

Newcomer Gathering

Whether you're a recent visitor, a seasonal guest, or new member, you are warmly invited to an evening of welcome October 7th 5:00 - 7:00 p.m.

Come meet clergy, staff, and parish leaders, enjoy fellowship with other newcomers, and learn about opportunities for worship, study, service, and community life at Trinity. Together we'll share good food, good company, and a glimpse of the many ways God is at work in our parish family.

How can you help?

Collier Harvest Foundation: Feeding Neighbors, Sharing Hope

Partnering with local agencies to fight hunger across Collier County since 1992.

Collier Harvest Foundation is dedicated to providing healthy, nutritious food to hungry neighbors across Collier County. Since 1992, this almost 100% volunteer organization has helped turn surplus food into life-changing meals.

How Do They Do It?

- Helping Hands: Rescuing surplus food from drives and daily retail collections, turning it into meals for those in need.
- Food Fast: Supplying partner agencies with specific foods on an immediate basis when urgent needs arise.

From its humble beginnings with a dozen volunteers serving 14 agencies in the Greater Naples area, Collier Harvest now partners with 40 agencies supported by 120



active volunteers. By recovering unused food, they not only feed the hungry, but also free agencies to focus more of their budgets on vital non-food services.

The Heart of Collier Harvest

Many volunteers have been with the foundation since its earliest days. Some continue family traditions, taking over delivery routes once covered by their parents. Others joined after moving to Florida or after helping with a 'Stamp Out Hunger' food drive. Whatever the reason, every volunteer brings life experience, compassion, and joy to the mission.

Disciples Called and Sent

I remember the first time somebody told me, "The Church is not a volunteer organization."

It was at a leadership retreat in a former parish. We had hired a consultant to help us launch a new program of Lay Ministry Development and Small Groups. In the course of his presentation, almost as an aside, he said, "Of course, the Church is not a volunteer organization." He was ready to move on, but I said, "Stop!"

"Say more!" He went on to recall that Jesus did not ask for volunteers. He called Disciples. He taught them. He equipped them. He sent them out; and he debriefed them and held them accountable when they returned.

Every moment with them was a teaching moment. When he saw them arguing about which one was the greatest, He taught them about servant leadership. When they came back from a mission exulting that even the demons obeyed them in His name, he taught them to be glad that their names were written in Heaven. When they vaulted themselves, because they had forbidden someone who was not following them to heal in His name, He taught them that "he that is not against us is for us."

Volunteers are different. In a volunteer organization, the person in charge asks for volunteers. Often, the same people volunteer for each asking, mostly for the best reasons, and a desire to help. But the effect is often that everybody else feels let off: "Barnabas will do it, Barnabas always does it, and besides Barnabas is better at it than I am. Let Barnabas do it."

Barnabas, on the other hand, sometimes feels like he is overextended. "But," he says, "If I don't do it, who will?" Meanwhile, the Leader feels like he's taking advantage of Barnabas, and sometimes Barnabas is really not the right guy for the job, but he can't correct him or ask more

of him, because, after all, Barnabas is a volunteer.

Disciples are called, equipped, and sent. They are also supported and held accountable. In a Church that follows the leadership model of discipleship, leadership and ministry look like this. The leaders approve a new ministry and pray about the best people to lead it. Then the Leader approaches the person they believe would be best to lead the new ministry, and says, "Barnabas, we're going to start a new ministry, and we think you might be the guy to lead it. We'd like to tell you about it, and if you're interested, we'll equip you to succeed and support you while you're doing it, with whatever you need. So, please pray about it. We know you're busy, and this might not be for you, but if you feel God might be calling you to serve Him in this way, please let us know."

At the end of *The Gospel of Mark*, after Jesus had taught his disciples, and had been crucified and risen and taken up to heaven and had sat down at the right hand of the Father, we are told that the Disciples "went forth and preached everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the message by the signs that attended it." That's a model of the Church and of Lay Ministry! *--Fr. Steve*

Almighty and everlasting God, by whose Spirit the whole body of your faithful people is governed and sanctified: Receive our supplications and prayers which we offer before you for all members of your holy Church, that in their vocation and ministry they may truly and devoutly serve you; through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

our faith, and join in prayer with generations past and present.


Why We Sing in Church:

Tuesday mornings at Trinity are filled with the sound of laughter and play as our youngest children gather for Mom's (and Dad's) Morning Out (MMO). For three bright hours, the nursery becomes a place of giggles, storytelling, block towers, picture books, and budding friendships.

This ministry is more than childcare — it's a gift of community. Parents are given a chance to breathe, run errands, exercise, or simply enjoy a quiet cup of coffee, while their little ones are nurtured in a safe, faith-filled environment.

One mom recently shared that MMO is "the highlight of my week — my kids come home smiling, and I come home refreshed."

Our nursery staff brings joy and creativity to every gathering. Donna, one of our caregivers, summed it up perfectly after her first MMO: "Today was so much fun!"

She spent the morning reading stories, playing pretend, and helping children explore new toys and crafts.



Parents, too, are noticing the difference. Returning families are thrilled to have this program back, while new families are often amazed that Trinity offers such a thoughtful ministry for children ages 1–5. "We are so glad to be part of this church family," one parent remarked.

Walking Together in Christ

Pastoral care is the ministry of presence, prayer, and support we offer one another as members of the Body of Christ. It is the care of souls.

At Trinity-by-the-Cove, pastoral care is walking together through times of joy and times of sorrow, bearing one another's burdens and celebrating God's blessings in our lives.

Pastoral theologian Thomas C. Oden describes the essentials of pastoral ministry in five ways:

Guiding – offering counsel, encouragement, and direction rooted in Scripture and tradition.

Healing – bringing Christ's comfort to those who are sick, grieving, or in distress.

Sustaining – standing alongside one another through hardship, struggle, and uncertainty.

Reconciling – mending relationships with God, with others, and even with ourselves.

Nurturing – feeding the soul through worship, prayer, teaching, and the sacraments.

These five touchstones shape our pastoral care.

At Trinity, that includes visiting parishioners in the hospital or at home, keeping our parish prayer list, meeting weekly as clergy to pray for our church, and planning worship that draws us closer to Christ.

Pastoral care is also present in life's holy moments and transitions. You may call a priest when you are seeking baptism, preparing for marriage, or making end-of-life arrangements. These are times when the Church surrounds us with prayer, guidance, and the sacramental grace of God.

Fr. Edward, Fr. Nicholas, Fr. Steve and I are here to walk with you—whether in celebration, in crisis, or in the quiet in-between seasons of life. Together, through prayer, presence, teaching, and worship, we care for one another and grow in the love of Christ.

The Depth of Prayers of the People

The Prayers of the People are a beautiful part of our Episcopal worship. They give us a way to bring before God what is on our hearts—our joys, our worries, our prayers for others—while walking together as a congregation. The structure gently guides us, but it's broad enough to hold each person's own story, each burden or celebration, even the quiet prayers we carry in silence.

As the prayers move from the Church and the world, to our local community, and finally to our own needs, they gather all of these scattered intentions into one rhythm of prayer. The concluding prayer draws everything together, offering it to God in a single, unified voice. In this way, the Prayers of the People remind us that we are not alone, that our lives and longings are held in the heart of God—and in the heart of this community. —*Fr. Edward*

Our Music at Trinity Concert Series kicks off this month on Sunday, October 19th at 4:00 p.m. with a concert by rising star cellist Gabriel Martins. His artistry has already been recognized through an extensive list of accolades including the Sphinx Competition Gold Medal, the David Popper International Cello Competition Gold Medal, and the Concert Artists Guild/Young Classical Artists Trust Grand Prize.



Some of his recent high-profile debuts have included Carnegie, Merkin, and Wigmore Halls, The 92nd Street Y, and the Great Hall of the Moscow Conservatory. *The Strad* magazine declared his all-Bach New York City recital debut as "flawlessly played ... a deeply moving experience" and *Classic FM* named him one of their "30 under 30" Rising Stars.

In recital, his interpretations of the Bach Cello Suites and arrangements of the Violin Sonatas and Partitas have garnered particular recognition. His Trinity program features a wonderful pairing of old and new: Bach's Cello Suite No. 1 with its unmistakable first movement prelude, his own arrangement of the infamous Violin Chaconne in D minor, and from the 20th century Zoltán Kodály's Sonata for solo cello.

Trinity Choir Choral Residency Summer 2026 in England.

I am so tremendously excited to share that the Trinity choir will be undertaking a **choral residency** next summer in England. The choir will be singing daily services at Chichester Cathedral from August 10th-14th, and at Southwark Cathedral in London from August 15th-16th.

Choral residencies are rooted in our common Anglican heritage, and offer many benefits, which include:

- Spiritual and musical enrichment for choristers.
 Singing in places that are the standard-bearers and origins of Anglican choral music deepens a choir's connection to this repertoire.
- Prestige and recognition of a choir's musical excellence
- An opportunity for pilgrimage, blending worship and fellowship. Participating in daily services grounds the choir in the spiritual life of the cathedral, offering a sense of continuity with centuries of worshippers and musicians.
- Support of the cathedral's liturgical life when their choirs are on summer holiday
- An attractive piece for recruitment as we continue to build our music program as a "destination choir", particularly amongst FGCU students, providing extraordinary opportunities that compliment their musical studies.







I am profoundly grateful to Fr. Elevated & Resilient Church

In response to the flooding from Hurricanes Ian and Milton, the Vestry formed the Storm Resilience Committee to discern how best to protect our sacred spaces for generations to come. After careful study, listening, and prayer, the Committee unanimously recommended replicating our beautiful church at a higher elevation and to modern codes. The Vestry agreed—and has now appointed a Building Committee to carry the project forward.

The Building Committee (John Eick, Chair; Mark Borelli; Mark Goebel; Helene McGill, Treasurer; Kathryn Morgan; and Jay Morgeson) has begun its work in partnership with architect Wil Ward and construction manager Bruce Gilbert. At the September 18th meeting, the Committee:

- Acoustics & AV: Kirkegaard reviewed the sanctuary's sound, recommending subtle wall and ceiling adjustments to enhance music and speech; streaming audio improvements are planned.
- Mechanical systems: HVAC design is being refined to provide quiet, efficient operation.
- Memorial gardens: continue to be a high priority to offer perpetual care and protection during construction
- Next steps: Cost updates will follow further design development, and a parish forum is scheduled for October 12th at 10:15 a.m.

These technical details may sound intricate, but they are the faithful work of ensuring our new church will be strong, beautiful, and resonant in worship for generations to come.

C. S. Lewis' fantasy children series, *The Chronicles of Narnia*, sparked a cottage industry with their global popularity. "Narnia for Grownups" will be a light-hearted seven-week course exploring and playing with theological themes and subtle insights throughout C. S. Lewis classic stories. We will hop and amble through each of the seven books, beginning with *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe* and ending with the apocalyptic *The Last Battle*. Crack open the books if you can, but come anyway—there's plenty of wonder to share either way!

Nicaea at 1700: Exploring the Nicene Creed November 9th - December 21st, 2025

This year marks the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea (AD 325), which gave us among other things the Nicene Creed which we profess every Sunday. After briefly exploring the historical importance of the Creed and Council, we will examine its continued relevance through a discussion of what it all means! You may even find, after we're through, that you are reciting the Creed on Sunday mornings with a deeper appreciation and understanding of the faith we confess.

Along the way we'll explore the heart's restlessness, why heaven is not boring (!), the nature of our ultimate hope, and what difference heaven makes to Monday morning.

Lenten Meditations on Scripture through Art with Jim Pagliaro

February 22nd - March 15th, 2026

Join art historian and fellow parishioner Jim Pagliaro along with Fr. Nicholas as we explore some artistic depictions of the passion and death of Jesus Christ during the season of Lent. We will lead meditations on Scriptural passages through visual renditions by some of Europe's greatest artists, including Giotto, Hans Holbein the Elder, Tintoretto, Titian, Cimabue, and more.

Tumaini Fund USA

In June, a group from St. Mark' Episcopal Church on Marco Island visited the Tumaini Orphan Support Organization (TOSO) in Tanzania, Africa. The trip included visits to the Chato Field Office and area orphan family visits, then Muleba-Kagera to visit families in their new homes, site visits to see new fresh water wells, observe hygiene classes and deliver hygiene kits. They also dropped in on the tailoring classes and carpentry schools in both Chato and Muleba.

Dr. Susan Wilson, CEO and founder of Tumaini Fund, Barbara Caldwell, Board member, and her husband Dave Caldwell traveled to Tanzania in late June. Reflecting on their visit, Dr. Wilson recounted, "there are so many children who need so much help. As I walked along the path, His Divine presence was so evident; visible in the least, the last, the lost."

officia 1 responsibilities are the care and upkeep of facilities and preparing our spaces for worship services and special events, there is shortage other tasks to keep him busy! And he will go






