Rector's Message

Although I confess that I haven't met a church service I haven't enjoyed in some way (I suppose that comes with being a priest), the Rite I Eucharist has always held a special place in my piety. As an adolescent, it was there that I served as an acolyte—kneeling beside the altar, serving the priest, and being so very near the Sacrament.

In that liturgy there is a moment that comes after the Confession and Absolution and before the Eucharistic Prayer: The Comfortable Words (BCP, p. 332). Though we do not traditionally use this optional portion of the liturgy at Trinity-by-the-Cove, it is something that has stayed with me—settled in my heart, my mind, and my imagination:

Come unto me, all ye that travail and are heavy laden, and I will refresh you.

God so loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son...

This is a true saying, and worthy of all to be received, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners.

The Comfortable Words were introduced into the Prayer Book to do something quite specific: to confirm the absolution we have just heard with the very words of Christ and his apostles, and to hold our Lord and Savior before the communicants in Holy Scripture as they prepare to discern his Body in the Sacrament. Their title is ancient, appearing in authorized volumes from the reign of Henry VIII under the editorship of Cranmer. The texts themselves seem to have been translated especially for the Prayer Book rather than borrowed from any single English Bible. They are meant to be heard—slowly, reverently—as promise.

Open your prayer book and pray them. Why? Because January is a season of planning. It is the time when we set budgets, think about giving, plan calendars, mark graduations, consider college decisions, and quietly reassess the shape of the year ahead. Make resolutions. It is a month of looking ahead—practical, hopeful, and sometimes with a weight of big decisions.

It is also an opportunity for you in your own faith journey. As you read through this newsletter—with its rich calendar of worship, formation, outreach, music, service, and the faithful work of planning for our future together—I invite you to pause. Not simply to think about all the things "done" at church, but to hear again the promise those Comfortable Words proclaim: that God offers refreshment for your soul through the life of this parish; that God so loved the world—loves you; that Jesus Christ is present for you here in this place, no matter how often we have kept God at a distance, and no matter how closely we have embraced him.

We do not step into 2026 alone. We step into it upheld by grace, strengthened for service, and invited—again—to come, to rest, and to trust.

Walking the Mourner's Path - Finding Hope after Loss

February 5th-March 26th, 2026

The funny thing about grief is that it seems to have a mind of its own. There is no taming it. There is no diminishing grief by the will of the mind, or the body. Grief seems to follow its own rules and its own timeline. But is that true? Yes and no.

Research on the effects of the loss of someone you love on the brain, and the body has been a focus within the field of psychology for some 20 years. One researcher, Mary-Frances O'Connor, an associate professor of psychology at the University of Arizona, studies these effects. She says grieving is a form of learning. Grieving teaches us to learn how to live in a world without that person we love. Adjusting to this new life, one which you did not choose, is painful. This adjustment takes time and involves changes to the brain. Regarding a grief episode such as the loss of a loved one, O'Connor says the data show that if you have support so that you have a little bit of time to learn, along with confidence provided by the people around you, you will adapt.*

Support and Time

In February, Cookie Coleman and Mthr. Marcella will begin a new eight-week session of **Walking the Mourner's Path**. The "Walk" is a gentle, Christ-centered program designed to support people who

are grieving the loss of a loved one. It is a place and time where mourners can gather, tell their stories, and slowly reconnect with hope. It's not about "getting over" loss; it is about learning how to transform the many feelings of grieving into new understandings as revealed by

God. We will walk alongside participants as they rediscover God's presence - especially in sorrow.

If you sense it may be time for guidance by the Holy Spirit in a spirit-led community, I would be honored to talk with you. Information cards are available at the Information Center in the Parish Hall. Losing Our Neighbors

Trinity-by-the-Cove awards grants to local non-profit agencies in Collier County on a 3-year cycle. This year we focused on Mental Health, Shelters and Exceptional Services. Special thanks go to this year's Grants Commission members for their excellent work: Barbara Roberts, Tim Truesdell, Carolyn Venable, Paul Perry, Hewit Rome Hawn, Jamie Halcom, Lizzy Ivy, Lawrie Foster, Jeff Growney and Nancy Nicoletti. Grant applications were evaluated for both the need and value of the projects and site visits were conducted. Our unanimous recommendations were ultimately approved by the Vestry.

A.N.A.'S FRIENDS

Awarded: \$10,000

A.N.A.'s Friends serves abused, neglected, and abandoned children across

SWFL. They operate a broad "Children's Needs" umbrella that meets essential and development needs for foster children. The request is to fulfill needs for their Inbound Rapid Response program (clothing, beds, tutoring, lessons, baby items, hygiene needs), "Heartfelt Hangouts" program (to underwrite experienced-based programs) and A.N.A.'s Comfort Closet (to stock initial supplies for a Naples-area satellite location). They serve 178 children in Collier County.



AVOW HOSPICE

Awarded: \$10,000

Avow provides hospice, palliative care and grief counseling services for terminally ill patients and families. They are requesting funds to replace one hundred sets of medical equipment (BP cuffs, pulse oximeters, and thermometers) used by their front-line nursing team. Approximately three thousand patients are served annually.



BEVERLY'S ANGELS

Awarded: \$10,000

They are focused on the A.L.I.C.E. community (asset limited, income constrained, employed), representing the hardworking families, teachers

and other service providers who earn above the poverty level but struggle to afford Collier County's prohibitive cost of living. They provide essential items for underserved youth and seniors, including maintaining a "crisis closet" at the Naples Police Department for emergency needs. Their request is to purchase and install a security system along with an inventory system. Beverly's Angels touched approximately 6,000 individuals last year.



CHARITY FOR CHANGE

Awarded: \$10,000

Their mission is to

elevate Pre-K to 5th grade children to achieve their full potential through character and charitable education, community involvement, academics and parental and community involvement. They are requesting funding to expand their reach to 650 additional children with their Character Education, Resiliency and Mental Wellness curriculum. This will involve updating their curriculum, training teachers and after school/summer partner leaders, creating and implementing new measurement tools and creating new program materials.

COLLIER RESOURCE CENTER

Awarded: \$10,000

They connect

individuals with the appropriate social service agencies and support them in finding effective solutions. This includes providing information, referrals, advocacy, and case management. Their request is to create a comprehensive marketing program to expand their reach, especially among underserved populations. They serve about 1,800 clients.



DAVID LAWRENCE CENTER

Awarded: \$10,000

They provide exceptional, lifesaving and life-changing behavioral health care

available to all ages. This includes mental health and addiction treatment and recovery. Their request is for renovation of the kitchen, bathrooms, and shared areas of Hope Home. Hope Home is a six-bed residence that provides residents with a safe, sober environment, guidance, weekly recovery meetings, and life skills development. A typical year will see ten individuals served.



FREEDOM WATERS FOUNDATION

Awarded: \$10,000

Freedom Waters Foundation works to

enhance the well-being of veterans and individuals with disabilities through unique boating programs. They are asking for funding to expand therapeutic and recreational boating programs for veterans under fifty. Funds would be used to purchase boat fuel, fishing bait, bottled water, lunches, t-shirts and docking permits. They anticipate serving about two hundred additional veterans.



GUADALUPE CENTER

Awarded: \$10,000

Their mission is to break the cycle of poverty through education for the children of Immokalee. They are requesting funding to replace classroom furniture, equipment, and outdoor playground tricycles. They serve more than 550 students across five campuses.




INSIDE OUT SOCIAL SKILLS

Awarded: \$10,000

They provide social skills training to

young people to help prepare them for a time of enhanced outcomes. This grant request would allow them to expand their After School Program, the Cohen Center and the Marco Y North and South programs. The grant would be used to pay instructors and purchase supplies. It would facilitate sixteen classes and graduate 166 children.



NAMI COLLIER COUNTY

Awarded: \$10,000

(National Alliance on Mental Illness) They provide mental health

support, advocacy, and education. They are asking for funds to purchase 12 iPads and accessories to be used in their Children's Mental Health Program. Last year, 936 children were served.

Losing Our Neighbors



RURAL NEIGHBORHOODS

Awarded: \$10,000

They provide affordable housing to very low, low and moderate income families and build livable communities for the working poor that enrich residents' lives. Their request is for the replacement of a 16-year-old playground in its Eden Gardens housing development. It will serve both Eden Gardens and nearby Hatchers Preserve and serve 168 children.



ST. MATTHEW'S HOUSE

Awarded: \$12,864

St. Matthew's House provides care, shelter, resources, and guidance for people experiencing hunger, homelessness, and addiction. They are requesting funds to replace the HVAC system for the men's dorm portion of Friendship House in Immokalee. This unit serves up to twenty-four men.



THE SHELTER FOR ABUSED WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Awarded: \$10,000

They provide housing

support and outreach services to help survivors (including domestic violence and human trafficking) recover and rebuild their lives. Their services include emergency shelters, school-based prevention programs, and training/education programs. Their request would provide for the replacement of nine computers. They anticipate serving approximately six hundred victims over the next 12 months.



S U N R I S E COMMUNITY

Awarded: \$10,000

Sunrise serves people with intellectual and developmental

disabilities. They are requesting funds to purchase and build a full Calming Sensory Room. Replacing an existing room, it will serve people with different sensory needs, particularly those on the autism spectrum. The immersive space will include visual, auditory, tactile, and vestibular tools that will help individual reduce stress, improve focus, and regulate emotions. Their current Adult Day Training center serves forty-six people.



YOUTH HAVEN

Awarded: \$10,000

Youth Haven provides Home, Hope and Healing to abused and neglected

children and teens. Their request is for funding to create an Independent Living Mentorship Program. It will include providing the credentials, materials and tools required for success in whatever field a student selects with his or her mentor. The number served by the new program is estimated at 75.


Women & Men of Trinity

Bishop Scharf Visit

Daughters of the King - Advent Quiet Morning

The Daughters of the King hosted a well-attended Advent Quiet Morning led by Bishop Douglas Scharf, centered on the hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." Bishop Scharf provided reflection materials with scripture and questions exploring the many names of Emmanuel—Wisdom from on High, Lord of Might; Branch of Jesse's Tree, Key of David; Dayspring from on High, Desire of the Nations—with the final meditation incorporated into the Eucharist.

Each meditation included the singing of the corresponding hymn verses, and during the Eucharist all eight verses were sung together. Bishop Scharf, an accomplished pianist, accompanied the hymns and delivered his meditations without notes, with a quiet eloquence that deeply moved and inspired those present. Many described it as a beautiful and meaningful way to begin Advent. Over 60 people





attended, including parishioners, guests, and Daughters from other chapters. The morning began with lively fellowship before settling into the stillness of reflection, and the parish hall was filled with conversation, hospitality, and an abundance of shared food. Pleasant weather added to the sense of welcome across campus.

The chapter is grateful to all who contributed, including Barb Bixby, Nancy Shields, Phyllis George, Lorraine Thurber, Fr. Nicholas, Father Edward, and chapter chaplain Mother Marcella Drawdy. Many parishioners later expressed their appreciation for this Quiet Morning.


About the Exhibition

Tumaini Fund

We are deeply grateful for all the Tumaini Fund has accomplished this year—made possible in great part by the generous support of many Trinitarians.

In 2025, donations helped build 17 houses; construct 11 clean-water wells (serving an average of 1,000 people per well); provide scholarships for orphans; supply mosquito nets to reduce the spread of malaria; and purchase bicycles for students who live miles from school, along with motorbikes to help Tumaini Fund staff in Tanzania travel long distances over rough terrain.

The Joe Meade Campus is also nearly complete. All structures are built, with some finishing work planned for 2026, and the social work office, tailoring school, and carpentry school have already moved from inadequate rented space into the new facilities where classes are now underway. Special thanks to the Women of Trinity for generous gifts that provided sewing machines for the tailoring school and funded an additional tailoring classroom in Biharamulo, where students are currently meeting in a small, primitive structure with an earthen floor.

While much has been accomplished, there is still much to do—especially in education, so orphans can become self-sufficient. In 2026, we will also work to raise funds for children whose crops have failed due to the current drought in Chato. We invite you to join us at our annual fundraising gala to help provide food, clothing, shelter, clean water, and access to education for His least little ones...

Sunday Forums Ahead

What is Faith Seeking Journey (FSJ)

Faith Seeking Journey is a one-year adult formation experience offered on Sundays—similar to the Church's long-standing Confirmation classes, but open to anyone who wants to go deeper.

"Faith-seeking" comes from Jesus' invitation to *seek first the kingdom of God*—a reminder that faith isn't something we "have," but a life we keep pursuing.

Over the year, you'll explore the timeless tools Christians have used for centuries—Scripture, daily prayer, and the sacraments—and discover how the Episcopal tradition can help you listen for God's direction and respond with a life of worship, service, and purpose as a lay follower of Christ.

Stages of The Faith-Seeking Journey

The Faith-Seeking Journey progresses through four clearly marked stages. You can choose to participate in each new stage. Each stage has its own focus, and style of presentation.

Inquiry Period

The Story of the People of God

The Inquiry Period starts in September and ends four weeks before Christmas. Storytelling provides the format for each session. The focus of the Inquiry Period is on the history of the Church, as the story of the people of God.

Formation Period

The Bible and the Liturgy of the Church

The Formation Period lasts from Advent through Epiphany. During The Formation Period you will learn to reflect on each Sunday's Scripture, as God's Word to his people. The focus of the Formation Period is on The Liturgy of the Word, with an emphasis on the Lessons of the Eucharistic lectionary.

Enlightenment Period

Daily Prayer and Rule of Life

The Enlightenment Period takes place during the season of Lent. During The Enlightenment Period you will explore the role of prayer in the Christian life; and acquire the basic skills for a personal Rule of Life. The focus of the Enlightenment Period is on The Book of Common Prayer, with a special emphasis on The Daily Office.

Initiation Period

The Sacraments and Our Calling to Serve

The Initiation Period lasts from Easter to Pentecost. During the Initiation Period, you will explore your life in Christ, in light of the sacraments of the Church; and discern your own calling to serve God in your home, work and community life. The focus of the Initiation Period is on the sacraments and ministry.



Elevated & Resilient Church

In response to the flooding from Hurricanes Ian and Milton, the Vestry formed the Storm Resilience Committee to discern how best to protect our sacred spaces for generations to come. After careful study, listening, and prayer, the Committee unanimously recommended replicating our beautiful church at a higher elevation and to modern codes. The Vestry agreed—and has now appointed a Building Committee to carry the project forward.

The Building Committee (John Eick, Chair; Mark Borelli; Mark Goebel; Helene McGill, Treasurer; Kathryn Morgan; and Jay Morgeson) has begun its work in partnership with architect Wil Ward and construction manager Bruce Gilbert. Updates from the November meeting:

- Outbuildings will be raised to match the church's finished floor elevation.
- Acoustical design adjustments were approved to preserve interior space while managing sound.
- The site development package has been submitted to the city; a Design Review Board application is planned for January.
- Planning is underway for the protection, relocation, and storage of the organ, bells, pews, and furnishings during construction.
- Construction costs continue to be refined as construction drawings are further developed and completed.
- The quiet phase of the capital campaign continues, with plans to launch the public phase at the Annual Meeting at the end of January.
- In light of current design, cost estimates, permitting, and fundraising progress, the committee unanimously agreed to continue moving forward with the project

These technical details may sound intricate, but they are the faithful work of ensuring our new church will be strong, beautiful, and resonant in worship for generations to come.
