# Rector's Message

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Here in Naples, High Season has a way of filling every available space—our calendars, our roads, our inboxes, and sometimes even our souls. The pace quickens. The days blur together. What began as good and joyful activity can quietly crowd out delight, rest, and attentiveness to God. In the midst of such fullness, the ancient wisdom of Sabbath is worth attention.

Sabbath is not simply about absence of work. It is about presence—presence to God, to one another, and to the gift of the moment we have been given. I have not yet managed to claim an entire day as Sabbath in my own spiritual life. Life, ministry, and responsibility conspire against that ideal. But what I have learned is that I can claim moments. And sometimes moments, faithfully kept, open a door into grace.

The hymn *Phos Hilaron*, which the Church has sung for centuries at sunset, gives us one such moment: *Now as we come to the setting of the sun, and our eyes behold the vesper light, we sing your praises, O God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.*

At day's end, when light softens and shadows lengthen, the Church invites us not to rush on, but to pause and praise. That pause—brief though it may be—can reorient the heart.

Jesus invites us into a similar attentiveness in Matthew's Gospel: *Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them.*

This is not naïve optimism, nor an escape from responsibility. It is a call away from anxious striving and toward trust. Even a moment spent noticing birds throughout the day—really noticing them—can remind us that our lives, too, are held in God's hand (I have a favorite mocking bird with a nest in the cocoplum hedge on the west side of the Parish Hall).

Then there is the simple, honest prayer from the Prayer Book, so fitting for the start of any day: *This is another day, O Lord. I know not what it will bring forth, but make me ready, Lord, for whatever it may be.*

Over the next month, I invite you to try something modest but intentional: claim three moments each day. In the morning, offer that prayer as a first thought on waking. During the day, pause—however briefly—to look at the birds, or any small sign of God's care. And at sunset, whether you are driving, walking, or standing at your window, offer praise to God for the light that has been.

My hope is that, as you return to these words again and again, they might become familiar enough to be memorized—as an exercise in discipline and gift. Words learned by heart often find their way back to us when we most need them. In the months ahead, perhaps these prayers and this bit of Scripture will rise unbidden to your lips or your mind, anchoring you in praise, trust, and readiness—quiet moments of Sabbath woven into even the busiest of days.

### **A Snapshot of our Impact**

*The full list of our 2026 Grants was in the January Trinitarian. As you think about your participation, here's a snapshot of three partner charities.*

**David Lawrence Centers for Behavioral Health**, which provides lifesaving mental health and addiction care for individuals of all ages. A Trinity grant is helping renovate Hope Home, a small residential setting where men in recovery find stability, guidance, and the skills needed to rebuild their lives.

**St. Matthew's House**, a long-standing partner offering shelter, food, and recovery programs for those experiencing homelessness and addiction. Grant funding is supporting critical infrastructure at Friendship House in Immokalee—ensuring that men seeking shelter and healing can do so in a safe and dignified environment.

**Sunrise Community**, which serves individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. A Trinity grant is creating a calming sensory room designed to reduce stress, support emotional regulation, and offer comfort for people whose needs are often unseen but deeply felt.

These are just a few examples of how generosity shared in fellowship becomes hope made tangible.

*Etudes and Earth, Wind & Fire* invites us into that story—not through obligation, but through joy. We gather because it is good to be together. We give because lives are changed when we do.

The sick are cared for. Those who feel overwhelmed find support. Those in need of shelter are met with dignity.

# *Invite. Welcome. Connect.*

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## **Invite as a Lenten Practice**



Inviting someone to church begins simply and gently, as an act of hospitality rather than persuasion. We do not “sell” the Church or

argue someone into faith; instead, we share what we love and where we find life. An invitation might sound like, “This community matters to me,” or “I’ve found a place of prayer and belonging here—would you like to come with me?” Our evangelism is rooted in relationship, storytelling, and welcome, trusting that the Holy Spirit is already at work. Our role is to extend the invitation and walk alongside others as fellow seekers, inviting them to share our life in Christ.



## **Welcome as a Lenten Practice**

Lent, which begins on February 18<sup>th</sup>, is a season when many people find themselves drawn—sometimes quietly,

sometimes unexpectedly—toward God and the life of the Church. Some are returning after time away. Some come out of habit. Some arrive unsure of what they are seeking, but aware of a longing they cannot quite name.

Those of us who are here week by week are often focused, rightly, on our own Lenten practices: prayer, study, repentance, and renewal. Yet Lent also reminds us that welcoming the stranger is holy work. In the Anglican tradition, evangelism is not pressure or persuasion, but invitation and hospitality.

Anglican evangelism understands that faith grows within community. People do not come to Christ in isolation; they come to Christ through his Body. To welcome the stranger, then, is not simply courtesy—it

is evangelism. It is how seekers are invited to share our life in Christ.

This Lent, consider making welcome itself part of your discipline. Pray daily that God might help us recognize Christ in those who arrive uncertain, hesitant, or unfamiliar with our ways. Pray that we may be ambassadors of Christ not by words alone, but by presence, patience, and kindness.

Small gestures matter more than we realize. A smile. An introduction. A word of reassurance for someone worried about doing something “wrong.” Through such simple acts, space is made for grace.

Lent is a season of repentance and return—for all of us. Let us return again to the work Christ sets before us: to see the stranger, to welcome them, and to make room for God to work through the life we share at Trinity.

## **Connect as a Lenten Practice**

All parishioners are invited to deepen their connection to the life of the parish by signing up for opportunities



in worship, formation, service, and fellowship. Whether serving as a lector, usher, chalice bearer, or joining the altar guild; participating in a

Bible study or forum; or lending a hand in outreach and pastoral care, each ministry offers a meaningful way to grow in faith and to support one another in the Body of Christ.

Signing up is more than filling a role—it is an act of belonging. Through shared prayer, learning, service, and time together, we are formed as a community shaped by Christ’s love and sent into the world for the sake of others. We invite you to prayerfully consider where your gifts and interests might meet the needs of the parish, and to take the next step by adding your name.

## External Volunteer Opportunity Trinity Community Grant Recipient Opportunity - Collier Resource Center

The Collier Resource Center, a returning Trinity Community Grant recipient, connects individuals and families with resources to meet immediate and long-term needs. Services range from emergency assistance with rent, food, and utilities to referrals for counseling, job training, parenting support, childcare, senior care, and medical resources.

CRC is a small organization with limited staff and a growing volunteer team. Volunteers assist with client intake by answering phone calls and emails, as well as office support, outreach, and grant writing.

# Pastoral Care

## Sunday Worship – Our Shared Work

One of the temptations in church life is to think of worship as something we attend—something we observe from the pew while a few people “do the service.” The New Testament gives us a decidedly different vision: worship is something we do together as the Body of Christ.

*Peter reminds the whole Church, who we are: “You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God’s own people” (1 Peter 2:9).* That phrase royal priesthood is not meant to flatter us—it’s meant to claim us. The baptized are not spectators. We are participants in God’s work.

*Paul encourages us in this way: “There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit... To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good” (1 Corinthians 12:4, 7).* To each. The Spirit equips every member of the community with something to offer, not for personal recognition, but for the building up of the whole Church.

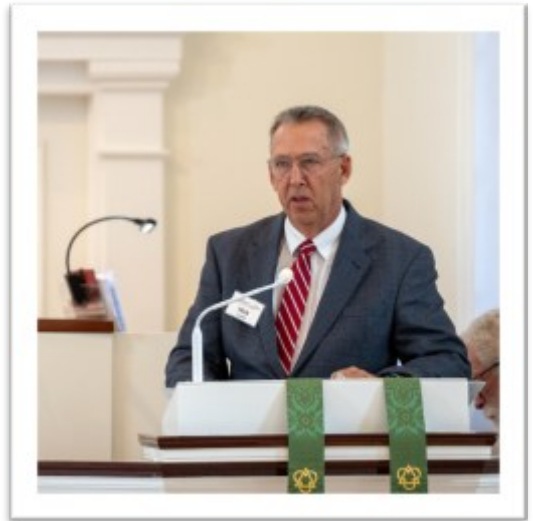
That is the spirit of our Baptismal Covenant. We promise to continue “in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers” (Acts 2:42). We promise to “seek and serve Christ in all persons” (Matthew 25:31-46). We promise to “respect the dignity of every human being” (Gen 1:26a). And every time we say, “I will, with God’s help,” we are saying yes to a life of shared worship and shared care.

Maybe you feel shy, uncertain, or unqualified. But the Church is and always has been made up of ordinary people offering what they have. The goal isn’t perfection—it’s faithfulness.

There are many ways to step forward. Some roles are visible: Greeters who welcome parishioners and visitors for worship; Ushers who promote orderly and calm movement within the nave; Lectors who give voice to God’s Word; Chalice bearers who offer the prayers of the people and serve the holy gifts of the Eucharist. Some roles are in the background; The Altar Guild, who prepare the altar and the vessels for worship; and the recently formed Geek Squad, are techs who manage the streaming of Sunday services. These are all holy works that support the body of Christ. Each role is as important as the role of clergy in the worship of God.

If you’ve been wondering whether there might be a place for you, consider this a warm invitation. There is a ministry that fits you, and you would never be asked to serve alone. You might try something new alongside a more experienced Trinitarian, offering your gifts at your own pace. As you do, you may find yourself belonging more deeply within our parish family. Each gift matters, and when it is shared, faith is deepened. As we step forward together, we help one another worship more fully—as the people of God, joined in prayer and praise.

# Daughters of the King

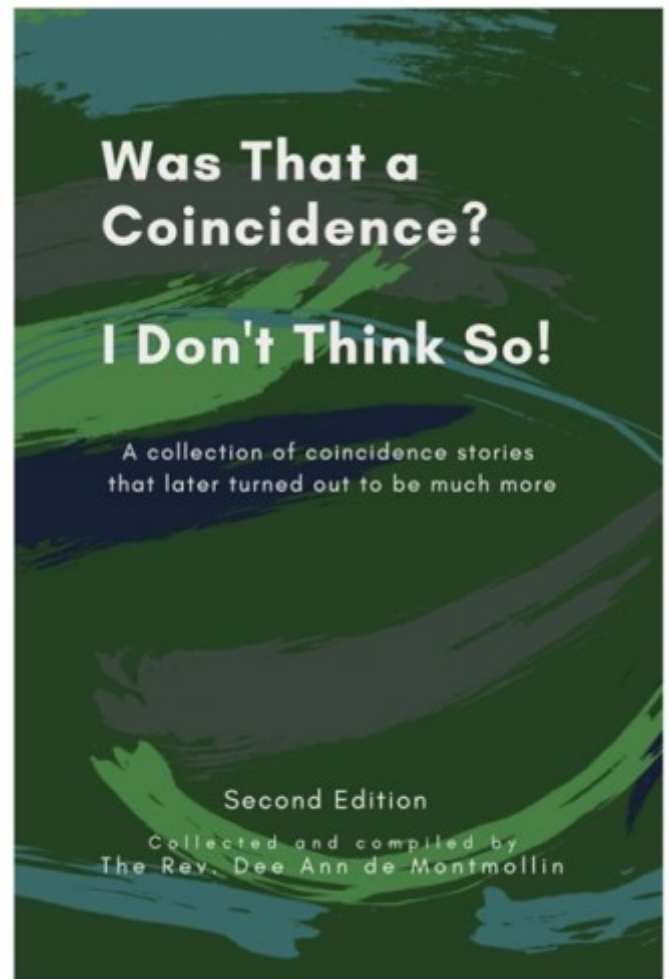

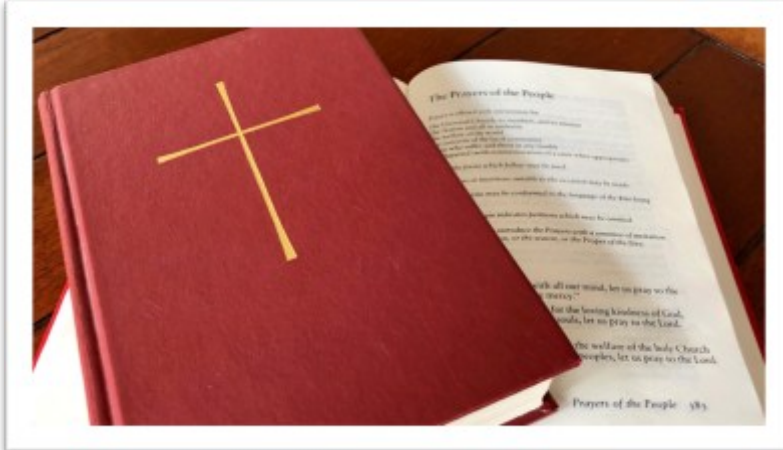

# Youth Lenten Service Project

## Youth Lenten Service Project: Guiding Our Common Prayer



This Lent, our youth are being invited into a meaningful service project—one that places their voices at the heart of our worship and helps guide the whole congregation into prayer and the youth perspective.

At the heart of the Holy Eucharist are the *Prayers of the People*. The *Book of Common Prayer* uses this title for what the Church has long called the *oratio fidelium*—the prayers of the faithful offered on behalf of the Church and the world. These prayers have a long and venerable history. Their existence is first

mentioned by Justin Martyr around the year 150, and for centuries they formed a vital part of both the Daily Office and the Eucharist. In the early Church, the prayers often took the form of a series of petitions chanted by a deacon, with the people responding each time, “*Kyrie eleison*”—“Lord, have mercy.”

Today, the *Book of Common Prayer* provides **six different forms** for the Prayers of the People. While their language and structure vary, each form follows the same ancient pattern of intercession, inviting the congregation to pray for:

- The **Universal Church**, its members, and its mission
- The **nation and all in authority**
- The **welfare of the world**
- The **concerns of the local community**
- Those who **suffer or are in trouble**

The departed, often with remembrance of a saint or the faithful who have gone before us.

As part of this Lenten project, our youth are being asked to reflect on what *they* see as important needs and concerns within these categories. Their insights—gathered through conversation with parents, emails, and prayer cards in the youth room—will help shape the prayers offered each Sunday during Lent.

In this way, our youth are not only learning about the Church’s life of prayer—they are actively helping to lead it. Their service this Lent will help guide the whole congregation as we pray for the needs of the world God loves.

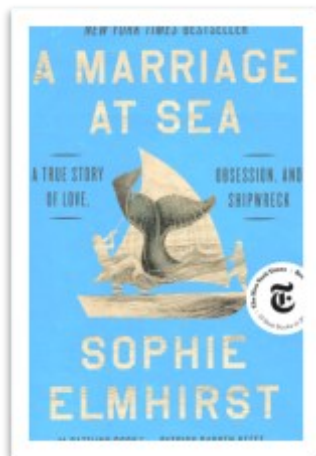
## Trinity Book Club

# Music at Trinity-by-the-Cove

Our February Music at Trinity Concert is one you will not want to miss! Continuing our practice in recent seasons of presenting some of the finest of vocal ensembles of this generation, I could not be more excited to welcome Ensemble Altera to Trinity-by-the-Cove on February 15<sup>th</sup>.

A chamber choir described by the *BBC* as “something extraordinary”, Ensemble Altera in its short history has already been identified as “a leading ensemble on the American choral scene” (*Scherzo Magazine*). Led by internationally celebrated countertenor Christopher Lowrey, the group has quickly become known for thoughtful programming, passionate performances, and tireless advocacy for the importance of ensemble singing in the broader music culture.

For their performance at Trinity they’ll present “*A new Song: Psalms for the Soul*”, which explores Biblical psalm texts “in all their dizzying variety”, with settings by familiar composers such as Bruckner and Parry, but also some wonderful present day composers that not be known to our audience, such as Caroline Shaw, Owain Park, and Ērik Ešenvalds. The most famous work on the program is undoubtedly Allegri’s “Miserere Mei,

Deus”, which bears one of the most famous backstories in choral music. Composed for the Sistine Chapel, the score was treasured by the Vatican; only three authorized manuscript copies existed, and performing it outside of the Sistine chapel was forbidden under penalty of excommunication! Legend has it that a young Mozart, upon hearing it in a service at the Sistine Chapel, transcribed the piece by memory and then being widely transmitted throughout Europe.

Second, please mark your calendars for Sunday, February 15<sup>th</sup>. At the 11:15 service that morning we will offer a special service of **Epiphany Lessons and Carols**, which follows the same liturgical pattern as our beloved Advent Lessons and Carols but with Epiphanytide subject matter, starting with the visitation of the Magi and ending with the Transfiguration on the Mount.

We did this service for the first time last year and it is back by popular demand! The choir will perform works by Palestrina, Victoria, Sowerby, Lauridsen, and Mathias. Join us for one last outburst of joyous Epiphany light before Lent begins!

## **Lenten Meditations on Scripture through Art with Jim Pagliaro** **February 22-March 15, 2026**

Join art historian and fellow parishioner Jim Pagliaro along with Fr. Nicholas as we explore some artistic depictions of the passion and death of Jesus Christ during the season of Lent. We will lead meditations on Scriptural passages through visual renditions by some of Europe's greatest artists, including Giotto, Hans Holbein the Elder, Tintoretto, Titian, Cimabue, and more.



## ***Faith-Seeking Joins Our Lenten Journey***

With the start of Lent, participants in this year's Faith-Seeking Journey will join us in special acts of prayer and devotion, as they explore the riches of the Anglican Tradition of prayer, as a resource for living the Christian life today. The goal of the Enlightenment Period of the Faith-Seeking Journey will be for each participant to develop a Rule of Life, that includes time to "turn aside" in prayer, to seek God, or a deeper knowledge of Him.

On the First Sunday of Lent "Seekers" will be enrolled as "Candidates" for Baptism, Confirmation, Reception into the Episcopal Church from another Communion (e.g. Roman Catholic) or the Re-Affirmation of Baptismal Vows, in the Rite of Enrollment. Each Candidate will then receive a Book of Common Prayer from their Sponsor, as a gift from the Church to aid them in their journey of drawing closer to God, during the season. Later in the Season, Candidates will formally "receive" the Creed and Lord's Prayer from the Church in another Rite, drawn from the practice of the Early Church (First through Fifth Centuries.)

During Lent, the focus of each Sunday session will be on a different aspect of daily prayer, including appropriate times and places, forms, dynamics and persistence in a life of prayer. The Season of Lent will draw to a close on Palm/Passion Sunday with a consideration of Jesus' life as the ultimate form of Christian Prayer; and a guide to prayerful decision-making in our daily life, as we move "forward, day by day."

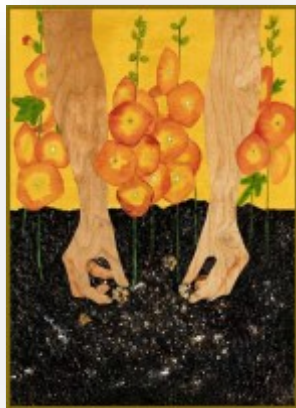

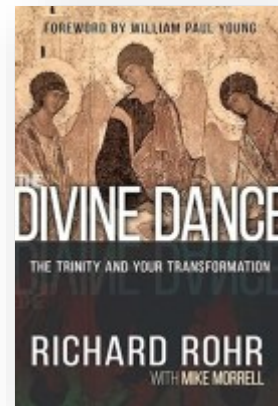

# A Firm Foundation

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## A Firm Foundation: Capital Campaign Launched

At our Annual Meeting, Trinity-by-the-Cove formally launched A Firm Foundation, our capital campaign to build a stronger and more resilient future for our parish. Campaign packets have now been mailed, and we invite everyone to prayerfully review the materials and join us in this season of discernment and generosity.

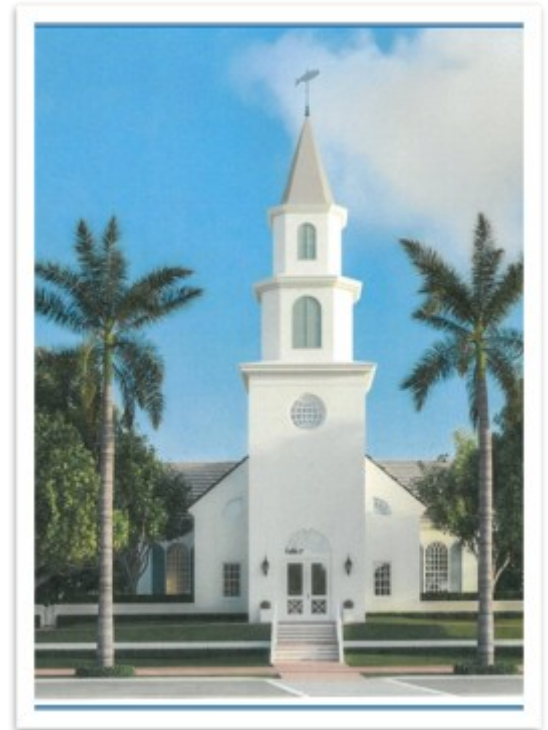
Please plan to attend the Next Building Forum on Sunday, February 8<sup>th</sup>, where we will share updates, answer questions, and continue the conversation together as a parish family.

As we move forward, it is important to keep both cost and purpose in view. Early estimates, based on square footage, placed the project at approximately \$10 million. As design work has progressed, that figure has been refined, and current estimates are closer to \$9 million, with final costs continuing to be clarified as construction drawings are completed. This is a significant undertaking—but also a generational investment in the life of our parish.

I am grateful to share that during the quiet phase of the campaign, **\$5 million has already been raised**, bringing us more than halfway to our goal. That generosity spans gifts from the widow's mite to \$1 million and includes savings from HVAC and structural work that would otherwise have been required for the new organ—together reflecting this parish's shared commitment to its future.

These details represent the careful and faithful work of ensuring that our future church will be strong, beautiful, and resonant in worship for generations to come.

Finally, I will continue to be available in the conference room on Sundays during formation hours for reflection and conversation as we discern this work together.
